
Black History Month: Saluting our Sisters

September has a been significant month for Langley, drawing 3 months of anniversary celebrations to a close with a wonderful service of thanksgiving held in London on 12th September.

uring these 3 months we have seen our organisation at its creative best, engaging clients, staff and volunteers in an array of events and activities. Badged the Sapphire Season, we embarked on making blueberry muffins at every opportunity! Fundraising exploded into life

with two of our directors raising money for their 65 km bike ride in the height of the summer, and another director completing a walk between different services, totalling 65 miles (not kilometres!) One colleague single-handedly raised £1700 with his triathlon in May, and our staff engaged clients in various

competitions, baking an anniversary cake, writing a poem, and creating a garden display to commemorate the 65th anniversary.

We were pleased to launch our new website and branding, and as part of this process we have also changed our name from langley house trust to langley trust.

At our thanksgiving celebration each of our client services was represented by a flag designed by that service. Presented in church, many by clients, and hung proudly from the balconies we saw a unique expression of what Langley stands for: we welcome and invite our people to ioin in, clients, staff and volunteers, those of all faiths and none. to stand with us and feel that sense of belonging, of being

safe, and at home.

This year we have proudly celebrated our 65th Anniversary of supporting people with convictions. We will continue to deliver this work, but have recognised the need to develop our brand, enabling us to continue this transformational work for the next 65

Our vision and mission to help people with convictions to transform their lives is as strong as ever. CELEBRATING OUR CHAPLAINS

If you are called to be a chaplain or volunteer with Langley, I would advise you to be genuinely committed to the role, as these high standards are required of everyone.

If you decide to become a chaplain with Langley – and you are accepted – it will be a fulfilling experience and you will love it! We are so grateful to our team of volunteer Chaplains who provide spiritual and pastoral support to our people in services and departments nationwide. Our volunteer Chaplains all share our passion to support people who have offended to transform their lives and to thrive, because everyone deserves another chance! Angela, one of our volunteer chaplains, has told us about her role at Mariposa House:

How long have you been volunteer chaplain at Mariposa House?
I have been a volunteer chaplain for three years

How did you hear about Langley and what led you to volunteer at Mariposa?

I first learnt about Langley about ten years ago when I was working with prison chaplaincy and with ex-offenders. When I was told that Mariposa was looking for a chaplain, I jumped at the chance (of course I prayed about it too).

What do you love about being the chaplain at Mariposa?

I love being accepted by the Mariposa women. They have experienced extreme difficulties throughout their lives and are understandably very guarded and distrusting of authority yet they trust me. What an honour!

A highlight for me has been when clients have visited our church; two are now regular attendees.

I love the Christian ethos at Mariposa which is enjoyed by everyone — whatever their faith. It is a huge privilege to be an integral part of the community of staff and clients. On a typical visit, I just sit, chat, and listen — mostly, listen. I am amazed how often the women ask for prayer.

Of course, I also pray for every member of the Mariposa community when I'm away from the service – whether they ask for it or not – I see it as my responsibility. I just love seeing how God answers these prayers.

I love the way that Langley values and respects its volunteers. We are provided with training; we are 'connected' through regular meetings, conferences and retreats; we even get thank you cards and aifts.

Do you have any advice for anybody who would like to become a chaplain or volunteer at one of Langley's services?

The standard of the organisation of the services and the professional care they give is excellent. They are an expression of God's love.
